

Defining styles continued....

Just about any element on a page can have a definition set up by you. In practice, of course, you will only want to consider a small number of elements.

Common elements that are effective when defined include those which affect text in some way:

- paragraphs, <p>
- lists, which can either be unordered or ordered . An unordered list is what we would normally mean by a bullet list, whereas an ordered list would be a numbered list. In either case the list elements themselves can also be defined
- Headings: can be of a number of levels, <h1>, <h2>... <h5>. <h1> is usually a main heading with the others as sub-levels. *These cannot be used inside a table.*

Or those which affect the layout:

- characteristics of a table <table>, table row <tr>, table cell <td>

In the Big Pond Hotel we have all these elements included and so we can experiment with how things will look.

In the <style> tag include:

Text in lists should be: Comic Sans, size 13, green

Paragraph text should be: Trebuchet, size 14, purple

The table should have a background color of yellow.

Take the top row of the table off (delete it) and instead replace it with a heading level 1 <h1> instead which should appear above the table. Make the definition for this heading Magneto, size 20 colour blue.
